When I was first asked to direct Sign My Name To Freedom, I was thrilled and daunted. Then I heard the songs that poured out of Betty. I know there was a magic to them and curiosity hooked me. How very Betty, to let curiosity lead me! How do you tell the 100+ year story of Betty Reid Soskin in one evening? What had started as a beautiful seed has now grown into a beautiful musical full of history through her voice.

Our History. I can relate to feeling my life has had many faces over time. We all have many different selves. Many of us learned about Betty the Park

Ranger, but Betty didn't start out aiming to be a Park Ranger. She was a little Creole girl who moved to Oakland and made a home here, built a Black business, had a family, spoke out and served her community. Girl. Mother. Activist. Ranger. She didn't plan where she was going, but rather met each opportunity or need in her path. In each moment her life shifted. Betty meets The Moment.

Betty's story is a story for us to see ourselves through. How can we live a life of questioning and showing up? How can we speak what needs to be said? How can we be in the present moment and still carry history with us? How can we lovingly bring our old selves along on the journey of our own becoming? How can we meet the Moment?

Rodney Earl Jackson Jr. (he/him) is the THRILLED Artistic Director & Co-Founder of The San Francisco Bay Area Theatre Company (SFBATCO), now in its 10th year! He made his Broadway debut in "The Book of Mormon" the same summer he began the venture of SFBATCO. In his 33 years of life, he has been blessed to grace international stages, participate in workshop/development processes for major plays and pre-Broadway shows (such as "Toni Stone" and "Ain't Too Proud"), and bring his artistic insights, creative experiences, and fresh ideas to his home theatre company: SFBATCO. A native of San Francisco, he cultivated his love and foundation for the performing arts, particularly theatre, through public city organizations such as SFartsEd, San Francisco Recreation & Park's YPTMTC, and the Ruth Asawa SF School of the Arts, where he graduated from the theatre department. He proudly holds a BFA from Carnegie Mellon University's School of Drama, and he acknowledges the incredible support of the SFBATCO staff and board, who champion his vision and creative voice in the Bay Area. Additional theatre credits include Berkeley Repertory's "Ain't Too Proud: The Life and Times of the Temptations", SFBATCO's "I, Too, Sing America" and "Toni Stone" co-produced by Arena Stage and American Conservatory Theatre.

Adam Maggio (he/him) is the Managing Director at SFBATCO. Born and raised in San Francisco, he worked in NYC and regionally as an actor and director before transitioning to producing. He's worked as an artist with companies including NYMF, Berkeley Rep, Connecticut Rep, and the Arsht Center, and has held administrative/producing positions at Mile Square Theatre and En Garde Arts.

Alex Jones (he/him) is the General Manager at SFBATCO. Alex is a Juilliard dance graduate and was a visiting scholar at Stanford Center for Design Research. He led innovation efforts at Yerba Buena Center for the Arts as their Experience Design Specialist and led programmatic efforts in creativity and innovation at San Francisco Unified School District and SF's Office of Economic and Workforce Development. He is a trustee at the African American Shakespeare Company, a graduate of the Ruth Asawa School of the Arts in SF, and has worked professionally as a dancer, actor, and composer.

Christine Chung (she/they) is the Director of Operations & Design at SFBATCO. Christine works in a variety of creative spaces focused on breaking barriers to access, exposure, and sustainability in the arts and storytelling landscapes. She focuses her work in non-profit theatre & performing arts, documentary short films, film festivals, and experiential immersive design. 
